EMMETT TOUR 2024

Carr's Address: 2731 Orchard Lane

Meet at Eagle Christian Church (Highway 44 just east of the intersection of Highways 44 and 16) - Road Construction may require we use another entrance into the parking lot - at 9:00 a.m. leaving at 9:30 a.m. to arrive at Carr's home at 10:00 a.m. Plan to leave on tour at 11:00 a.m. Doughnuts, coffee and juice will be available prior to the tour. Al and Dee Borden say the tour is mostly on sand and gravel roads. There will be a stop at the Emmett Sports Complex to use the restrooms prior to going to the Carr's home.

Return to Carr's home for lunch and visiting. Lunch will be catered by Okie Dokie Dogs with Hot Dogs starting at \$4 each with sides of chips, soda, and water also available for purchase.

Please bring your own chairs for sitting on the grass.

<u>Directions from Boise:</u> Highway 16, come downhill into the Emmett Valley. Take the first left turn onto Cherry Lane opposite the fruit stand BEFORE you reach the bottom of the hill. There is a left turn lane for Cherry Lane. Cross the canal, turn left onto Orchard Lane. Watch for the American flag at the first house on the right past the pasture.

<u>Directions from the west/New Plymouth area:</u> stay on Highway 16 past Albertsons to the next signal and turn right onto Substation Road. Continue on Substation for three blocks, and turn left onto Cherry Lane. Turn right at the second street, Orchard Lane, and look for the American Flag at the first house past the pasture.

Park in line ready to go. The driveway is wide enough for two cars wide, so park side by side and don't block the way for others.

ALL MODEL A'S ARE SURVIVORS

I can remember when Model As were knock-about cars. They weren't taken seriously. You could see them used as utility vehicles that had seen better days. During my high school years, there were three other Model As driven to the student parking lot each day besides mine. My dad bought my car for me in 1965 for \$350, which at the time was top dollar.

I made friends with guys my age who also had Model As. Most drove their cars hard, but their cars somehow withstood the abuse. I saw all kinds of modifications that were intended to personalize the cars and make them go faster, which they often didn't.

One of my friends was more serious about restoring his car, even back then. I always wanted my car to be as nice as his, but never achieved it at the time. Nevertheless, I tried my hand at bodywork and paint on my own car. It turned out pretty good considering my lack of experience.

I did all kinds of so-called repairs that sometimes made an improvement. Through it all, my car survived and proved to be a patient teacher.

It surprises me that after so many years, original Model A parts are rather easy to find. They are stored in boxes, stashed in garages, mixed in mounds of junk piled on rural properties and in random collections of other Model A owners; and of course, swap meets. A boon to the modern Model A owner is the network of parts houses and other club members. Reproduced parts today are generally superior to those available during my youth.

Now, nearly 60 years later, Model As are no longer seen as third tier, but antiques to be pampered. Restorers of all stripes take advantage of the availability of parts and published materials that endeavor to teach the novice how to repair and restore their cars.

The Restorers Class exists to help the average Model A owner enjoy his car while continuing to improve its originality and preserve it for upcoming generations. In that regards, things are about the same for the new Model A enthusiast today as they were for me all those years ago, only better.



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JIMS TECH TIPS

"Preventing Problems with the Starter Switch Rod"

The Starter Switch rod passes through the firewall and screws into the Starter Switch. You step on the head of the rod to start the car.

You will find that today's reproduction rods screw quite easily into and out of the switch. This can be nice when you are assembling things.

But I have found on more than just a few cars the engine vibration can cause the rod to unscrew itself and back out of the switch. You hit a bump and the rod drops down and makes contact with the post on the starter switch, where the battery cable connects. Yikes! That's a direct shot to ground, with a LOT of amps behind it.

So you want to make the rod a bit harder to turn when installing it in the switch. Add a small drop of blue thread lock to the rod before you screw it in, or gently tap the threads a little with a hammer to deform them and make them harder to screw in and out.

Another simple solution, if you are not doing a car for Find Point Judging (because it is not how the switch was originally done), is to add a 5/16 nut to the threader end of the rod before screwing it into the switch. When you have the rod where you want it (desired button height inside the car, etc.) use that nut as a jam nut and lock the rod to the switch. It will not back out while driving, but you can easily undo it when you need to take it apart.

Whichever approach you choose, you will have more trouble-free miles if you get ahead of this potential problem. Until next time...

LADY A'S SELF DEFENSE CLASS A SUCCESS!


About 16 of our members met on February 29th (leap day) for a 2 hour hands-on lesson in self defense designed especially for women.

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
